




A Local History Book has been added to the SMVGS reference shelf at the SMPL

Let Me Tell You, Memories of Dutch Wilson, A California Cowboy, has been donated to our society. It is a delightful book which describes the life of Raymond “Dutch” Everett Wilson, and his two brothers, Lawrence “Link” Vestal Wilson and Elmer “Ell” Elliott Wilson. It depicts life growing up on Nacimiento Ranch, Paso Robles Ranch, Cojo Ranch as well as Jalama and Sudden Ranch in the Lompoc, Los Prietos Ranch, and Rancho San Fernando Rey in Santa Ynez, and several others in the Los Alamos area. Dutch’s wife, Mary Wilson made a name for herself as a local schoolteacher in Los Alamos. The names of many prominent families in the Santa Maria, Santa Ynez, Los Alamos area who participated in The Figueroa Club, and Rancheros Visitadores, are mentioned by name. The book has numerous pictures of local people and a Genealogy of the Wilson – Elliott Families.



ed. note.: Dutch Wilson was a local cowboy and known to be something of a character, at least in his later years. I attended Los Alamos Elementary School, and his wife, Mary, was my teacher from 3rd through 8th grades. In addition to *Let Me Tell You*, Dutch Wilson also wrote *Cattle Upon a Thousand Hills*, a pictorial book of cowboy life in the local valleys. I own a copy and am willing to lend it to a member for a short time.
